Lancashire & Cumbria Denominational Ecumenical Officers (DEOs) Meeting

18 September, Hyning Monastery, Carnforth



September was a busy month for Churches Together gatherings. In last month's newsletter, Jo reported on representing CTiC at a regional meeting in Manchester. So this month, I thought I'd share a little about attending a more local gathering, only just over the border in Lancashire, with DEOs from Lancashire and Cumbria.

We were very warmly welcomed by the sisters at Hyning - with a glorious lunchtime spread, largely created from their own produce - and also had the privilege of sharing in midday worship and prayer in the chapel and visiting their wonderful icon-writing studio.

As a newbie, there was lots for me to learn as different officers from different denominations reported on their local patches - much as the local groups report in this newsletter - on ecumenical services, events and initiatives. We talked a little about social audits (Cinnamon Trust and Gather) and also faith covenants, too. Doral Hayes and Sarah Ball also joined us from Churches Together in England and highlighted, among other things, the Bill Snelson Fund for young ecumenists

We also had a presentation from Prof John Whitton, Diocesan Environmental Officer for Blackburn, who is supporting all the north-west dioceses on what he prefers to call 'Creation Care' (rather than Net Zero Carbon 2030). He talked about measures being taken by rural and urban churches to reduce their carbon footprint - including the new infra-red heating at St Margaret's, Wythop, in Derwent Deanery, which has been a

huge hit with their PCC because it heats up in minutes (rather than hours!). Find out more here: https://www.blackburn.anglican.org/creation-care-and-the-env...

Churches Together in England: All Ecumenical Reps Conference

29 September-1 October, Hayes Conference Centre, Swanwick

This year's busy gathering of about a hundred ecumenical officers from all over England (and just one from Wales) had the theme 'Journeying Together'. We reflected on the meaning and power of pilgrimage in various ways - through the 4 contrasting artworks chosen for our shared 'visio divina' on Monday night led by Lindsey Brown, on our own sun-blessed group walk together in the fields to the east of Swanwick and by listening to stories of ecumenical pilgrimages in the West Midlands and hearing about a new 'how to' pack developed by Churches Together in Cornwall.

Other sessions took the 'distance travelled' motif to report on the processes and achievements of ecumenical groups on various issues - Diversity & Human Sexuality, Racial Justice and Inter-Faith Working. Time after time the same themes recurred - a sense of frustration at the rate of progress, even of going backwards in some regards especially in polarising times, but also the necessity of deep listening and relationship-building for meaningful and lasting change - and, finally, our shared commitment to working and praying for 'holy unity'.

I learned so much by taking part in all these plenaries - and also from Fr Dragos Herescu's fascinating introduction to the history, challenges and faith outlook of the Orthodox Church, and from our shared worship sessions - including Quaker prayer, Pentecostal praise and a Taize service. Most of all 'just' listening to, and building relationships with, so many kind and conscientious Christian colleagues - between the formal sessions - was, for me, a delightful three-day pilgrimage into ecumenism.

Praise and prayerful gifts for our neighbours

A window into Churches Together in Seascale and District

The members of our CT group are Seascale Methodist Church, Gosforth Methodist Congregation (worshipping in St Mary's Church Room), St Joseph's Roman Catholic Church in Seascale, and Anglican churches from Beckermet in the north to

Waberthwaite in the south, and inland to Wasdale Head and Eskdale. (Not all of these send representatives to our committee meetings, and the main focus tends to be Drigg, Seascale and Gosforth.)

Over the years we have held outreach activities such as giving out mince pies at Christmas or hot cross buns at Easter, always with a short gospel message on a napkin or leaflet. When people ask, 'Are you collecting for something?' it is good to be able to reply, 'No, it's a gift from your local churches.' Local knitters have made duckshaped bags in which we have given out chocolate eggs, and craftspeople have made pottery crosses which have also been distributed in the villages.

In recent years a very fruitful partnership has developed with **Phoenix Praise** worship band, who hold a monthly evening service in Gosforth. Three or four times a year (eg Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, an outdoor Pentecost service and an autumn service in the former One World Week) these become joint events with Churches Together, with publicity across the area and usually a visiting speaker. Our (fairly brief) Annual Meeting has sometimes been followed by a speaker, but in recent years has featured a quiz based on the format of TV quizzes (Only Connect and House of Games) but with church- and Bible-based questions.

Shared space and fellowship on Alston Moor

Formal CT meetings have ceased between the churches on Alston Moor - we used to have a banner but no one knows where it has gone or whether it said 'Churches Together...' or 'Christians Together...' now. But that doesn't mean that we don't work well together [or that Churches Together in Cumbria doesn't want to hear your news - Ed!]. We see quite a lot of each other, in fact, and not just on ecumenical occasions like the World Day of Prayer and the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, but also to celebrate each other's special events, too. For instance, Anglicans, Methodists

and Roman Catholics were on the bus that went to Andy Morsman's recent ordination as a Deacon in Newcastle Cathedral.

We also produce a magazine together called 'Faith in the Moor' with its title reflecting the double aim of celebrating that there are many in the area who are loved by God and called to be saints (not just those who attend the local churches or the Quaker Meeting House but also those who belong to fellowships elsewhere such as Weardale, Hexham and Penrith) and also that those very people love where they live and are involved in lots of the other groups that make this a flourishing community.

The Methodists worship in St Wulstan's, the Roman Catholic Church, and their funerals usually take place in St Augustine's, the Anglican Church in Alston. The Vicar of the Anglican Parish of Alston Moor has six churches to look after: three are in Cumbria and three in Northumberland, in the Diocese of Newcastle. The Catholic Parish of St John Boste serves Penrith, Alston, Appleby and Kirkby Stephen and the Methodist Church is part of a wider circuit.

One blessing we are all grateful for is the **Chat Room** on Front Street, open for a couple of hours every weekday morning, for a cuppa and a chat, but also a very useful venue in a community without any church halls! Every Thursday there is a Holy Communion Service at midday to which all are welcome. We are very grateful to the married couple who had the vision to set this up.

The Council of Nicaea 1700th
Anniversary: Honest
Disagreement in Love: Nicaea
Then & Now

(Conference in Blackburn 12th – 13th Sep 2025)

In September, the 1700th anniversary was marked by an ecumenical conference in Blackburn Cathedral, organised in partnership with Churches Together in Lancashire (Anton Muller).

The First Council of Nicaea, held in 325 AD, was the first ecumenical council of the Christian Church, convened by Emperor Constantine I in what is now modern-day Turkey. It aimed to address some growing divisions within Christianity and to establish a unified doctrine. One key outcome was the formulation of the Nicene Creed, articulating the foundational beliefs of Christianity.

Theologians, ecumenical leaders and local participants engaged in meaningful conversations about unity, respectful disagreement and how faith communities can respond to contemporary conflict in the world; demonstrating how the work at that first Council is still resonating in the Church today.

Professor Rachel Muers from the University of Edinburgh presented on the Friday evening, there was a choice of different debates and workshops to attend on the Saturday, an ecumenical act of worship and the sermon in the cathedral on the Sunday morning.

Other contributors included: Fr Andrew Louth, Fr Aidan Nichols, Fr Damian Platt, Rev Dr Jeremy Morris, Rt Rev Philip North, Dr Victoria Turner, Rev Dr Peter Colwell, Tim Norwood and Stephen Cooper.
