

CESG Annual Network Day



The Cumbria Ecumenical Spirituality Group met for our annual resource day at Rydal Hall on October 24th to further develop our practice of peer supervision, in the service of our spiritual directees.

The day was spent exploring how to best prepare for supervision. We reflected on what kinds of interior movements (eg joy, irritation, sadness, peace) we as spiritual directors had experienced whilst directing. By exploring a wide range of emotional movements and counter movements, we worked together to raise our

awareness of the underlying reasons for the reactions we may have during a session. Without awareness, these responses could interfere with the director's capacity to stay fully present to the directee's experience in the spiritual direction session.

After a demonstration of the theory explored through Maureen Conroy's book, 'Looking into the Well', we spent the afternoon working in threes to practice peer supervision. The day helped participants to have a clearer appreciation of the value and purpose of supervision and a model to work with.

All spiritual directors on the network must engage in supervision and the CESG is committed to best practice to safeguard directees.

About ten years ago a couple of women here in Cumbria decided to offer our county as a more local place for the Preparation Day for the Women's World Day of Prayer (as it was then), instead of organisers having to travel greater distances to neighbouring counties.

On 21 October this year, Rev Mary Elliot and Hazel Scott Bowes once again organised such a day for representative groups from churches from different parts of Cumbria at Langwathby. We met Margaret Clark and Audrey Ecclestone, two members of the WDP National Committee, and they guided us through the material prepared by the women of Nigeria for next year's service.

A very lively, informative and challenging day was enjoyed by all. WDP resources were available including a thoughtful Bible study and songs reflecting the theme of 'I will give you rest... Come', including a traditional Igbo chorus accompanied by drumming. As usual, the talented Helen Armstrong was our musician and Kathryn and Lizzie from Alston provided delicious refreshments throughout the day to supplement our packed lunches.

It was very encouraging to welcome women from a variety of church traditions who had never attended such a preparation day before. We all went away feeling better equipped and enthusiastic about organising own local World Day of Prayer services next year on 6 March.

Anna Chaplaincy

Keeping warm and keeping an eye out for our older folk this winter.

As the temperatures begin to plummet and snow is seen on the fell tops of the Cumbrian mountains, there will be many older people who are struggling to keep warm, with expensive fuel bills and houses that are difficult to heat.

As Anna chaplains we will come across these older folk in their homes and it is always important to keep a good eye out for them as the minus temperatures begin to set in.

Age UK have many good tips for the elderly to help keep them warm. They recommend ensuring that they eat regularly and have plenty of hot cups of tea or coffee throughout the day. If a flask is left for an older person who can no longer move about, then these people are particularly at risk of hypothermia. Suggest leaving a second flask next to them, so that they can keep up their warm drinks. A hot water bottle in a fleecy cover is also a good idea but ensure it isn't too hot to scald someone. A heated over-blanket is also good at keeping someone warm, as long as they can turn it off if they get too hot.

Putting glazing tape on the windows to prevent draughts or applying for grants for more insulation will help keep the bills down and the heat in.

Chair exercises are also a way of keeping the circulation moving around the body and keeping warm.

A nice thick, fleece or blanket on someone's lap also helps if someone is sitting for a long period of time.

If the ground is icy outside, then encourage them to stay indoors. Many elderly people each year end up in Accident and Emergency due to falls on ice.

Warm soups are good for keeping warm and keeping nutrition up.

Encourage the older person to keep a supply of essential medicines in the house in case they can't get out. Over the counter items like cold and flu medicines can also be helpful.

But most of all, if you have an elderly neighbour, keep an eye out for them to check that they are safe in the cold temperatures.

Carols in Cumbria

This year's God for All Christmas campaign is about to launch at <u>carolsincumbria.com</u>, with a digital radio advert and social media activity running from 1–25 December to help people across Cumbria find a local carol service.

The radio advert will be played on Heart and Smooth across Cumbria, with additional digital advertising on Facebook and Instagram. On the website, people will be able to browse carol services, view them on a map, and filter by keywords such as

"candlelight", "traditional" or "outdoor". Each service will have its own page, which can be found on Google and can link back to a church website or Facebook page. Last year, the Carols in Cumbria website had over 5,000 visitors, more than 350 services listed, and almost 100 people registered their details to attend a carol service. Many churches reported seeing new people as a result. All advertising directs the public to the Carols in Cumbria website, where they can search for nearby services. A further benefit is that the services will appear in Google results, so anyone searching for a local carol service is more likely to see their nearest options near the top of the page. As Christians, we are called to seek justice and challenge injustice. But making that a regular part of church life isn't always easy. Single Friendly Church Network Christmas Resources

Christmas can be one of the hardest times of year for single people. Our research suggests 70% of single people find at least some aspects of Christmas difficult. Some find the focus on families challenging, while 43% say the week between Christmas and New Year is a lonely time.

However, **80% of single Christians tell us that they enjoy carol services!** We encourage churches to provide something for everyone in their Christmas

calendar this year, and make a special effort to ensure carol services are welcoming towards people coming alone.
